

Military Rifle Shoot

Rules:

Allowable Firearms:

Restricted to as-issued military service rifles from World Wars I or II. For example; M1 Garland, Mauser, Mosin Nagant, Lee Enfield to name a few. Rifles with scopes or have been modified with different stocks other than the as-issued stocks will be allowable as a separate category.

Rifles may be shared among competitors. Example two individuals may use the same rifle to compete.

Scoring:

Scoring will be completed using the standard targets supplied by the range. A total of 5 shots in 5 minutes will be attempted on the target. Score will be marked out of a possible 50 points.

Fees:

Entry fee each week will be \$5. The gathered fees will be split equally between the club and into a pot to be split among the winners of each firearm category at the end.

Distances:

The distance each week will alternate between 50, 100 and 200 yards.

Safety:

All the standard range safety rules are in effect during the shoot. If necessary a range safety officer will be assigned as required.

Firing Positions:

The use of any form of artificial support that is not specifically described in these rules is prohibited. Rifle magazines may touch the arm or shooting jacket sleeve, but may not touch the ground or be used to provide artificial support.

Standing Position

The competitor must stand on both feet while supporting the rifle with both hands, the shoulder or upper arm and the cheek. The arm that supports the rifle may rest on the hip or side of the body. The other arm must grasp the rifle at the pistol grip. A sling may remain attached to the rifle, but it may not be used to support the rifle. If the sling remains attached in As-Issued Military Rifle Matches, the sling may be within the grasp of the left hand (right-handed competitor) or it may pass over the outside of the hand. The Carbine sling may not be used to support the rifle in standing.

Prone Position

The competitor lies on the ground, with the head towards the target, with the rifle supported by both hands, the shoulder and cheek. A sling may be used in the prone position. The rifle may not touch the ground or rest on any object or support. No part of the arm ahead of the elbow may touch the ground or any artificial support. The magazine may touch the shooting jacket, but may not compress the jacket sleeve to the ground so as to provide artificial support.

Bench position:

The competitor shall be sitting at a bench, not using any form of support or sling with the rifle fired from the hands.
